

Staphylococcus

(staph infection)

Staphylococcus is a species of staphylococci bacteria of the Cocci family.

These bacteria can live without causing any harm on many skin surfaces, especially close to the nose, mouth, genitals, and anus. When skin is damaged or punctured, staphylococcus bacteria can enter the wound provoking an infection.

There are over 30 species in the staphylococci family that cause different diseases, e.g., urinary tract infection (UTI), but most staph infections are from the species *Staphylococcus aureus*.

Symptoms:

Skin infections such as folliculitis, furuncles, impetigo, and **cellulitis**. These bacteria can also cause disorders like food poisoning or toxic shock syndrome.
